

Becoming A Deacon - Part 2 of 3



As I stated previously sixty-five men started with me in the diaconate, but through the years many left, and only twenty-three men were left to be ordained as deacons. There was much preparation that needed to be done for ordination. Invitations had to be mailed out, a gift registry needed to be done, along with making sure I had the items I needed for ordination day. Spiritually I had to stay focused, which I continued to attend adoration daily.

The week leading up to ordination was very exciting, but on the other hand knowing you would not be seeing all the men, that have been on this journey with you every other Saturday, was heart wrenching. The time it really started to sink in that I was going to be ordained was at practice. Ordination day was on May 21, 2016 (my granddaughters birthday) .

I can remember the morning I was getting ready. I turned to Josette and said "I am not worthy of this" and began to cry, but Josette told me yes you are. It was time for me to leave so, I looked at her, gave her a kiss, and we both started crying, but it was

tears of happiness. The next time I would speak to her I would be a deacon. I left with my alb that my siblings had given to me a week prior to ordination. Inside of it was the slip from our children's baptismal gown sewn in, which has all their names and dates of that sacrament. A surprise that Josette hid from me.

Ordination seemed so unreal, like a fog. I can remember when I had to prostrate on the floor for the Litany of the Saints. The only way I can explain it is that I felt as though all of the saints were present at the cathedral with me. When the bishop laid his hands on me was very special. Being vested by my spiritual director Fr. Clint Trahan, who stuck with me through the five year process, truly touched my heart. The bishop handed me The Book of Gospels, that my parents had purchased for me, but when I saw Josette bring up the gifts I cried. Knowing the joy and love I felt for her, and knowing all that she gave up for me. The past five years had led up to this. All of this had touched our lives so profoundly, and at that moment I knew this is where I was meant to be.

At the reception I finally got to speak to Josette and my family. I was overcome with emotion and when we saw each other we cried happy tears. I was overwhelmed seeing so many people that had come to witness my ordination. All the other men that had ordained that day were also there with their families. We were all celebrating the end of one journey and the beginning of another. Now I had to prepare for my first mass as a deacon.

Pope Francis

Be Close to the Unemployed

Pope Francis today drew attention to one of the problems of the world that seems closest to his heart: that of unemployment.

The Holy Father has mentioned dozens of times the plight of young people who can't find work, most recently on his return flight from Poland on Sunday, when he spoke of how fundamentalist groups such as ISIS grow off the disillusion of youth who don't have hope for the future because they don't have work

Today, the Pontiff touched on the problem in light of a popular feast day in Argentina, St. Cajetan's feast on Aug. 7.



Cajetan was a 16th-century Italian priest who helped the poor, founding among other things, a hospital and a bank. He is recognized as a patron of Argentina, as well as being a patron of the unemployed.

The Holy Father recalled how he lived celebrations of the feast day as archbishop of Buenos Aires: "To greet, to listen and to support the faith of those simple people ... and, so often, facing the anguish of men and women that want and seek work and do not find it. I was only able to shake their hands, caress them, look into their tearful pain-ridden eyes, and weep within. Yes, weep, because it is hard in one's life to come across a father of a family who wants to work and has no possibility to do so."

The Pope noted how living from the state, or from other charities, is not the same as being able to work for your living.

"Bread is easier to have because there is always a good person or institution that provides it, at least in Argentina," he said, but "It is one thing to have bread to eat at home and another to bring it home as the fruit of one's work. That is what confers dignity."

The Holy Father concluded by encouraging the bishops to also do their own work: "In this feast of Saint Cajetan, may all of us Bishops be able to accompany our brothers that ask for bread and work. And may we do so with affection, closeness and prayer; and, let us also ask for that grace for ourselves: may work never be lacking, that work to which the Lord sends us and which confers dignity on us."

Fete-Dieu du Teche

Come let us adore Him! Fete-Dieu du Teche, Eucharistic Boat Procession down Bayou Teche, will take place on the Feast of the Assumption, Monday, August 15. All are invited to a Mass in French at 8am at St. Leo the Great in Leonville to begin the day. Bishop Douglas Deshotel will preside and give the homily. At the end of Mass, there will be a procession from Church with the Blessed Sacrament to the boat landing. At 9:30 am 50 boats will disembark in procession and make their way down Bayou Teche, retracing part of the actual journey of our Acadian ancestors, toward St. Martinville. The boat procession will stop at each Church along the way for recitation of the rosary and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament (10:20 am - 11:05 am in Arnaudville; 11:45 am - 12:30 pm in Cecilia; 1:35 - 2:20 pm in Breaux Bridge; 3:15 - 4:00 pm in Parks). The procession will arrive in St. Martinville at about 4:45 pm and disembark behind Notre Dame de Perpetuel Secours and enter the Church for Benediction. The procession will continue on foot to St. Martin de Tours for 5:15 pm Benediction and then down main street to Mater Dolorosa Chapel for Solemn Vespers and Final Benediction at 6:00 pm. Confessions will be heard at each of the stops along the way, including before Mass in Leonville and at Mater Dolorosa from 5-6 pm.
