


## First Friday Mass & Adoration



The first Friday of the month is often marked by special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. St. Margaret Mary Alacogue (1647-1690) reported visions of Jesus Christ directing her to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on nine consecutive First Fridays in reparation for sins and in order to show love to Jesus. In return for this act of devotion, which usually includes Mass, Communion, confession and even an hour of Eucharistic Adoration, our blessed Savior reputedly promised St. Margaret Mary the following blessings: "In the excess of the mercy of my Heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour."

Our next first Friday is July 2nd. Please join us for 6:30am Mass followed by Adoration from 7-8am. Sacred Heart of Jesus, make my heart like yours!

#### JESUS SAID TO JAIRUS,

# "Do not be afraid; just have faith."

MARK 5:36

#### **FAITH PRECEDES HEALING**

As always on Sundays in Ordinary Time, the Old Testament reading illumines today's Gospel. In the longer form, Jesus performs two healings; and the Book of Wisdom proclaims our God the God of life, who "fashioned all things that they might have being" and formed human beings in "the image of his own nature," to be "imperishable" (Wisdom 1:14; 2:23). People of faith, therefore, choose to live God's "undying justice (righteousness)" (1:15) in this mortal life, thus beginning, even now, the undying life for which we were created. To choose otherwise is to choose the other side: the devil and death (2:25). Mark presents the two healings as a story within a story, a "story sandwich," a literary device that reinforces his message for those who originally would have heard, not read, the story. Mark wants to emphasize an essential truth of his Gospel: that Jesus does not perform miracles to compel faith, but rather that faith precedes healing.

#### JUST HAVE FAITH

Jairus' daughter is the child of an important, privileged man, who publicly seeks out Jesus and loudly proclaims—and demonstrates—his faith, "falling at Jesus' feet and pleading earnestly with him" (5:22–23). The anonymous woman virtually "sneaks up behind" Jesus and, though clearly filled with faith, keeps that faith to herself until Jesus draws "the whole truth" out of her after her cure (5:27–28, 33). All the more impressive, then, that Jesus delays his healing of the seemingly "more important" and younger woman for the unknown, truly marginalized older woman. Returning to the "domestic church," so to speak, of Jairus' house from the public setting of the older woman's cure, Mark tells us that Jairus' daughter has died. In the face of a hopelessness even more definitive than that of the hemorrhaging woman, people tell Jairus "why trouble the teacher any longer?" (5:35). But Jesus does not consider his response to Jairus' faith hopeless or a bother: "Do not be afraid; just have faith" (5:36). Despite death's apparent triumph at Jairus' home, Jesus grasps the child's hand—even though the law prohibited touching the dead—and bids her, "Talitha koum—Little girl, I say to you, arise!" (5:41).

#### WHY BOTHER?

So Mark seems to be asking us: Like Jairus on his way home or like the woman after twelve years, will we wonder, why bother? Or keep walking in faith with Jesus? Is a silent touch of Jesus' garment—a quiet prayer of faith—enough for us? In the face of apparent hopelessness, will we choose faith over despair despite the ridicule of

the crowd, remembering that Jesus has grasped us by the hand in baptism and commanded us to rise? Note the Gospel's ending: after bidding Jairus' daughter rise, Jesus commands that she be given something to eat (5:43). So, too, Jesus invites us now to feast at his eucharistic sacrifice and banquet!

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## Pope Francis

## Pope at Audience: On the Cross, Jesus prayed for each of us

At a recent General Audience, Pope Francis concludes a long series of catechetical lessons on "prayer," focusing on the priestly prayer of Jesus.

As he concluded his catechetical cycle on prayer – which began over a year ago, in May 2020 – Pope Francis said "the most beautiful thing to remember" is "the grace that we do not only pray, but that, so to speak, we have been 'prayed for,' we have already been received in Jesus's dialogue with the Father, in communion with the Holy Spirit."



Prayer, the Pope said, "is one of the most evident features in Jesus' life... because the dialogue with the Father was the incandescent core of His whole existence."

#### Core of Christian proclamation

Although Jesus prayed throughout His earthly life, said the Pope, His prayer became even more intense in the days and hours leading to His Passion and Death, the "central core" of the Christian proclamation, which shed light on the whole of Jesus' life.

Jesus "was not a philanthropist who took care of human suffering and illness: He was and is much more," the Pope said. Jesus offers us "total salvation, messianic salvation, that gives hope in the definitive victory of life over death."

And so, Pope Francis added, "in the last days of His final Passover, we find Jesus fully immersed in prayer": In the agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, where He confidently addressed God as 'Abba,' Father, a word expressing intimacy and trust; and on the Cross, "obscurely shrouded in the silence of God," where once again He calls on God the Father.

#### Cross fulfills Father's gift

On the Cross, said Pope Francis, "the gift of the Father is accomplished — who offers love. That is, our salvation is accomplished." When Jesus cried out to God on the Cross, saying, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit," the Pope explained, He offered "everything. Everything is prayer, in the three hours of the Cross."

Jesus' prayer, the Pope said, "is intense, the prayer of Jesus is unique and also becomes the model for our prayer." Pope Francis insisted, "Jesus prayed for everyone, He also prayed for me, for each one of you. Each one of us can say: 'Jesus prayed for me on the Cross.' He prayed. Jesus can say to each one of us: 'I prayed for you, at the Last Supper, and on the wood of the Cross.'"

#### We are never alone


Pope Francis said we must "keep this in our heart, we must never forget" that Jesus prayed for each of us personally. "We were willed by Jesus Christ, and even in the hour of His Passion, Death, and Resurrection, everything was offered for us."

So, the Pope concluded, "with prayer and with life, all that is left for us is to have courage, hope, and with this courage and hope to experience strongly the prayer of Jesus and go forward: so that our life might give glory to God in the awareness that He prays for me to the Father, that Jesus prays for me."


