- You realize that God has a sense of humor
- You want to go to Confession more

### 10 Things That Happen When You Go To Adoration More Often

1. You develop a sense of awe and wonder The more you sink into that silence in front of the Host, the more you'll realize that the only response is awe and wonder at the greatness of our God.

2. You experience peace in other areas of your life

It leads to an inner peace that affects all areas of our lives. It doesn't mean everything in our life will be perfect and without suffering, but Christ's peace means that we know that the storms of life can't shake us.

3. You begin to look outwardly

More time praising and adoring God means you can look beyond your own concerns and see the needs of others in your life and in the world that we live in.

4. You get bored sometimes

Know that even if an hour spent in Adoration

is a continual returning to Him every few minutes when your mind wanders, you are still giving God the best gift you can – your time and company.

### 5. But you become excited going to Adoration

The more time you spend in Adoration discovering that God is a God who loves you and wants to spend time with you, the more you begin to actually

want to go.

### 6. Grace enters your life

It's amazing how a simple act of committing to even a short time of regular Adoration makes such a huge difference to the rest of your life. You can carry that moment of being in His presence with you long after you've left the church or chapel. His grace sustains you in every moment, especially in moments of temptation.

### 7. You realize how fortunate you are

If it is as simple for you as getting in the car and driving to Adoration at church, or even walking to the chapel nearby, you realize how much you can take it for granted. There are those who would love to spend more time with Jesus in Adoration but who are housebound, sick, or busy parents. Then there are those around the world who actually risk their lives for the Eucharist, in places where they are persecuted for their faith. When you remember those who walk for hours or days in dangerous situations in order to be present with Jesus, you realize what a gift it is to be able to pray openly, not to mention having a priest to minister the sacraments.

### 8. You realize that God has a sense of humor

The more you are able to sit and let God speak to you (instead of spending all your time filling the silence with talking to Him), you'll find that God has a really good sense of humor. He likes a joke or two, and sometimes these moments are funny enough to make you want to laugh out loud.

9. You want to go to Confession more

Confession allows us to experience the mighty boundless ocean that is God's mercy.

### 10. You fall in love

When you spend more time with an open heart in Adoration and just let Christ love you, then you'll fall in love too. That love will define you and allow you to be yourself. "I came that they may have life, life in all its fullness." (John 10:10)

# 5 Points To Receiving The Eucharist

### 1. Receive the Eucharist in a state of grace

This first key point isn't only a good recommendation, but actually a requirement. The Code of Canon Law gives us some insight into this. Can. 916 "A person who is conscious of grave sin is not to celebrate Mass or to receive the Body of the Lord without prior sacramental confession unless a grave reason is present and there is no opportunity of confessing..." In summary: If you have committed a mortal sin, walk right on over to the confessional, be reconciled with the Lord, and then go receive Him in the Eucharist.

### 2. Observe the 1 hour eucharistic fast

Again, this one is also a requirement... Can 919: One who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain from any food or drink, with the exception only of water and medicine, for at least the period of one hour before Holy Communion. This doesn't apply to those who are sick or elderly.

### 3. Arrive at Mass a few minutes early

Attending Mass and receiving Jesus Christ in the Eucharist is the most significant thing we could ever do. Take a few minutes before Mass to prepare your heart to receive Christ, pray, and be intentional.

### 4. Make an act of reverence before receiving the Eucharist

5 Points To Keep In Mind When Receiving The Eucharist

- Receive the Eucharist in a state of grace
- Observe the 1 hour eucharistic fast
- Arrive at Mass a few minutes early
- Make an act of reverence before receiving the Eucharist
- Make a prayer of thanksgiving after Mass



You are going to receive the body, blood, soul, and divinity of the King of the universe, how could you possibly show the respect and reverence due in this moment? Honestly, we can probably never show the amount of respect that our Savior deserves, but we can do what we can!

This can be done by making a deep bow before receiving the Eucharist. In this reverential act, we acknowledge who we are before God and humble ourselves to receive Him.

### 5. Make a prayer of thanksgiving after Mass

After we receive Communion, we are the most united with Jesus we can be on this side of heaven. This is our chance to open our hearts to Him without reserve. To pour out our love, and ask for whatever grace we need.

# First Friday Mass & Adoration

The first Friday of the month is often marked by special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690) reported visions of Jesus Christ directing her to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on nine consecutive First Fridays in reparation for sins and in order to show love to Jesus. In return for this act of devotion, which usually includes Mass, Communion, confession and even an hour of Eucharistic Adoration, our blessed Savior reputedly promised St. Margaret Mary the following blessings:

"In the excess of the mercy of my Heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour."

Please join us every first Friday of the month for 6:30am Mass followed by Adoration from 7-8am. Sacred Heart of Jesus, make my heart like yours!

Dear Friends in Christ,
