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First Friday Mass & Adoration

The first Friday of the month is often marked by special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-1690) reported visions of Jesus Christ directing her to promote devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on nine consecutive First Fridays in reparation for sins and in order to show love to Jesus. In return for this act of devotion, which usually includes Mass, Communion, confession and even an hour of Eucharistic Adoration, our blessed Savior reputedly promised St. Margaret Mary the following blessings: "In the excess of the mercy of my Heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour." Please join us every first Friday of the month for 6:30am Mass followed by Adoration from 7-8am. Sacred Heart of Jesus, make my heart like yours!

We are happy to announce that the JMJ Coalition Women's ACTS Retreat is August 22-25, 2024! The name of our program is The JMJ Coalition ACTS Retreat. This name is a result of Fr. Andrew Schumacher and Fr. Brent Smith teaming up to provide ACTS retreats to parishioners of their parishes: St. John the Evangelist in Mermentau, LA, St. Margaret of Scotland in Estherwood, LA, and St. Joseph's in Rayne, LA.

The ACTS weekend is presented by lay Catholics, with support provided by a Spiritual Director/companion or clergy. Are you interested in deepening your faith and finding a communit of faith to help support you on your faith journey? If so, consider attending a JMJ Coalition ACTS Retreat. Typically held twice a year for both men and women, the retreats begin Thursday evenings with check-in at 5:15 p.m. Retreatants return on Sunday in time for Mass.

Registration for a retreat opens a few months before it is scheduled to take place, usually at noon on Sundays. Registration remains open until all spots have been filled. PARISH FORMATION Anointing of the Sick

What is anointing of the sick?

A sacrament instituted by Christ that bestows spiritual healing and comfort to the sick, and potentially physical strength and healing.

Why is this sacrament called anointing of the sick, or extreme unction?

Because this holy unction, or "anointing" with blessed oil, is made upon the faithful in extreme cases, e.g., dangerous illness or possible death. Different names were used for this sacrament in the first millennium: holy oil, the unction, unction of the sick, the blessing of consecrated oil, unction of God, the office of the unction, etc. Extreme unction became general in the Latin Church from the twelfth century, and after the Council of Vatican II, it has commonly been called anointing of the sick.

Who may be the minister of anointing of the sick? Only a bishop or a priest can administer this sacrament. What conditions are necessary for receiving this sacrament validly?

The recipient must: 1. Be a Catholic; 2. Have at least the potential use of reason; 3. Begin to be in some danger from sickness or old age.

Why must the recipient have the use of reason?

Because "the form of this sacrament does not apply to children, since they have not sinned by sight and hearing, as expressed in the form. Therefore this sacrament should not be given to them." **Must we be in immediate danger of death to receive extreme unction?**

No, indeed, it would be a serious failure in charity to delay the sacrament until all hope of recovery is lost, or the person is approaching unconsciousness.

How should the recipient conduct himself during this sacrament?

As much as possible, he should unite his intention and sentiments to the prayer of the priest, confidently offering God the sacrifice of his life, if this be His will.

How should we assist a dying person in his last moments? We should pray with and for him, frequently offer him the crucifix to kiss, excite him to hope in God, suggest pious aspirations, repeat the blessed names of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, and at his last moment, recite the prayers for recommending a departing soul.

What is a suitable prayer for accepting one's death?

O Lord God, with true contrition for having offended You, I accept from Your hands, with faith, hope, and love, this death with all its pains, anguish, and suffering, in reparation for my sins and for love of You and for Your greater glory, through Jesus Christ Our Lord. O Mary, my seet heavenly Mother, St. Joseph, and my dear Guardian Angel be with me, protect me, and accompany me as I come before the face of God. Jesus, Mary, Joseph!

Pastoral Letter for the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker

(To be read at all masses on the weekend of April 27-28, 2024)

My Dear People of the Diocese of Lafayette,

Wednesday, May 1st, the Church celebrates the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker. It is also designated by resolution, St. Joseph the Worker Day in the State of Louisiana. We look to the example of St. Joseph to remind us that human labor is noble, creative and a means of enriching the lives of others. The human person, given reason and free will by God, imitates the creative power of God, sustains the human life he is given by God, meets the needs of his family and enriches the community he lives in.

In the miracle of the incarnation, God became one of us in the person of Jesus Christ our Savior. He entered our world in the Holy Family under the care and support of St. Joseph His foster father. The Bible tells us that St. Joseph worked as a carpenter providing for the needs of the Holy Family. St. John Paul II reminds us that after Jesus was found by Mary and Joseph in the temple, "He returned with them and came to Nazareth and was obedient to them". The Pope remarks that it should be understood that Jesus shared in the work of his father and He was known in the Gospels as, "the carpenter's Son".

Work is part of God's plan for the human person. To this end, Pope Pius XII established the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker on May 1, 1955. He wrote, "The humble craftsman of Nazareth not only personifies to God and the Holy Church the dignity of the laborer, but St. Joseph is also always the provident guardian of us and our families." The Pope saw the danger of unbridled capitalism or atheistic socialism. Both demean the nobility of human labor by reducing human labor to only a servant to company profits or an impersonal servant of the state.

On the feast of St. Joseph the Worker, we are reminded that for the laborer, St. Joseph is a just man, a faithful spouse and father and a hard worker. He cares for his family, he guarded and protected Mary and Jesus, was obedient to God and faithful to his calling. On May 1st, we pray that St. Joseph inspire and pray for all who labor in this life.
